

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In Druid thought and practice, Awen is seen as the spirit of inspiration, represented by the Goddess Cerridwen for many neo-Pagans. The Awen symbol (left) is three dots and three lines, often contained within a circle. The dots represent the three drops of the brew in Cerridwen's cauldron that splashed onto

the hand of Gwion Bach, granting him wisdom and knowledge. The three lines, or rays, symbolize a myriad of concepts, depending on who you ask. In my own personal practice, I see Awen as the Holy Spirit. Many Druids begin rituals by chanting the word, "Awen" (AH-OO-WEN, drawing out each syllable).

Chanted on a single tone:

AWEN --- AWEN --- AWEN

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful, And kindle in us the fire of your love.

O God, send out your spirit, And renew the face of the earth.

Eternal Spirit, flow through our being and open our lips That our mouths may proclaim your praise.
